Parish Council

Climate Change

The October Sparsholt Parish Council meeting was visited by Stuart Mills from WeCan (Winchester Climate Action Network) to talk about and answer questions on local community action on climate change and Sparsholt's plan in particular. Stuart is employed by WinAcc a local charity as Climate Officer and also works as Project Officer for home energy improvements, so he is well placed to answer residents' questions on what support is available for home energy improvements from draught proofing through to solar panels and even replacement heat source boilers. The importance was stressed of having a proper (beware scammers!) heat loss survey undertaken first before embarking on any structural changes. Stuart or I can point you in the right direction. It seems unlikely the village will have a gas mains installed anytime soon and therefore will not benefit from emerging hydrogen based technology for home heating. The current Government is not prioritising this approach anyway so the majority of us are stuck with oil fired boilers for the moment unless the Government makes changes to subsidies which make moving to a heat source pump more competitive. This makes ensuring your home is properly insulated even more important.

On recycling there are plans in place to increase the grades of plastic that WCC can collect following an upgrade to the recycling plant in Eastleigh which has now passed the planning stages. Once again the Government is not in favour of investing in increasing recycling rates, preferring to persuade food suppliers to reduce the quantity of non recyclable packaging materials used in the first place.

Finally Stuart highlighted the critical importance of having 1 or 2 enthusiastic village volunteers to support the Parish Council on its climate action change programme by holding events such as a " climate cafe" to inform and raise awareness. So if you feel you can support Sparsholt Parish Council in this important work and are committed to making a difference however small please contact me in the first instance.

Thank you to Terry Dunn



The Ham Green Conservation Group Volunteers gathered at Sparsholt Memorial Hall on Saturday morning 5th November to thank Terry Dunn who recently retired as leader of the Group for his many years of hard work and commitment to looking after this important local nature amenity enjoyed by many Sparsholt parishioners and the wider Winchester community.

Terry joined the group in 2004 and took over leadership in 2014 from Anne Gledhill. There are at present 16 volunteers who keep the bridle way and footpath mown and clear for walkers, cyclists and horse riders, cut the hedges, maintain the grass clearings and manage the woodland including coppicing. We hold a monthly work session on a weekend morning and anyone who would like to join us would be welcomed.

In addition to organising regular activities Terry has led a number of projects over the years and in the last two years he had the task of dealing with the impact of ash dieback disease. So far 20 diseased ash trees have been professional felled by local tree surgeon Peter Yeates and to date 16 new trees have planted to replace them.

Arrangements were made to water the new trees during the drought and we recently placed wire mesh guards around them to protect against animal damage whilst they get established. The cost of the tree guards was met by a generous donation of £625 to the Conservation Group from Sparsholt Parochial Church Council as part of the money raised at the Jubilee celebrations in the village.

In marking our thanks to Terry the Volunteers presented him with a year's subscription to Bird Watching Magazine which knowing his interest in wild birds will keep him occupied, a commemorative mug and a beautiful bowl made of green ash cut 4 years ago by volunteer Clive Felstead and which was turned by fellow



volunteer Tony Gazzard on his lathe.



In addition, a collection was made in the village with parishioners showing their gratitude to Terry for his considerable endeavours with a donations totalling £175 for a John Lewis gift voucher which Parish Council Chair Sue Wood presented to him on behalf of the villagers.

Terry intends to continue lending a hand to the Group when he can and will be available to offer advice when needed to Malcolm Hewson who has taken over as leader.

Local City Councillors' Report

Proposals for changes to the Local Plan

- This is the first version of the new Local Plan (Regulation 18), that includes the proposed development policies and the proposed allocation of sites for new development. There are some significant changes in the policies that have come forward.
- Energy efficiency. New homes will need to be built with no fossil fuels used for heating or cooking and must operate at net zero carbon. Developers may find this target hard to deliver initially.
- Water efficiency. New and refurbished homes will have to manage the use of water very carefully. This will need external assessors that will add costs for smaller schemes.
- Sustainable Travel. New homes that generate extra demand for travel will need to contribute to public transport schemes. In rural areas, it is hard to see how this can be used to improve local travel arrangements.
- Affordable Housing. More flexibility in the amount of affordable housing is proposed, with a lower % required on brownfield land. Of the affordable homes built on a site, 65% must be for rent and 25% must be "First Homes" (always to be sold at 25% below the market price).

Proposals for new development site allocations were also published. These include 900 new homes at Sir John Moore Barracks, but without any of the safeguards to the rural character of Littleton that the Parish Council are demanding.

Despite rejection by South Wonston Parish Council, allocations for 63 new homes have been made in the village, including sites near Chaucer Close and West Hill Road North. We will continue to object to developments on green fields in the countryside like these when brownfield sites exist.

Soon after the death of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, we were all proud to come together as a Council to parade in front of Winchester Guildhall. There we heard the Mayor of Winchester give the local **Proclamation of Accession for King Charles III.** This ancient ceremony marked the beginning of a new reign, so our involvement in this important event was very moving.

We have recently joined the Adjutant General's Corps based at Worthy Down as they exercised their **Freedom of the City.** The right of Freedom of Entry is an ancient privilege and allows a

Regiment to parade through the City with 'bayonets fixed, drums beating and colours flying'. It comes from a period in our history when only trusted units would be allowed to carry arms within city boundaries.

We all need to keep a watchful eye on the proposal for the **Three Maids Hill anaerobic digestion plant.** A summary of the August public consultation is here

It was announced that WCC will be launching a £200,000 **Cost of Living Support Package** for households in the district that may be struggling during the crisis. This is in addition to the support being provided by central Government and takes into account the council's local understanding of the impact of the crisis on the residents of Winchester.

Winchester City Council is working with Network Rail and London and Continental Railways (LCR) to explore potential opportunities for the regeneration in the area around Winchester Railway Station.






CENSUS 2021 - HIGHLIGHT RESULTS FOR WINCHESTER DISTRICT

TOTAL POPULATION COMPARISON

THE WINCHESTER POPULATION HAS INCREASED BY 10,905 (9.4%)



2021 **127,500** 2011 **116,595** In the ten year period the population has increased at a faster rate than Hampshire (6.3%), the South East (7.5%) and England (6.6%).

The Winchester population increased at a faster rate in the period between 2011 and 2021 than it did between 2001 and 2011. In the 2011 Census the population was estimated at 116,595, an increase of 8.7% since the 2001 Census.

The biggest population increase of 11.8% has been in the 65+ age group. There was a notable decrease of -16.5% in the 0–4 demographic, but the 5–14 age group saw a 2.1% increase from 2011 to 2021.

News from around the District

Colden Common - local residents are organising a climate cafe this Sunday 6 Nov at 11am at the <u>Church Rooms</u>. Plus the parish council is writing a climate change action plan for the village.

Swanmore & Waltham Chase - a local resident organised a climate cafe last Sunday, and six people are now meeting up later this month to set up a local climate action group.

Littleton & Harestock Parish Council Environment Group is meeting up this Sunday with several residents who attended their recent climate cafe, to start planning local activities around the climate crisis.

South Wonston <u>Sustainability</u> are planning a thermal imaging scheme and looking at training volunteers to carry out home energy surveys.

Upham Parish Council is planning a climate cafe on the 4 Feb. **Itchen Valley** Parish Council Environment Committee surveyed residents recently about their views on the climate crisis. They had 100 responses, and will be presenting the results soon. Action on Carbon in **Twyford** is holding a Green Open Home event on 12 Nov - there's still a few places left.

Colden Common School Cycle Bus

A great way to get kids on bikes, local resident Tony Higginson started a school cycle bus last year to give school students (and commuters) the opportunity to cycle safely into Winchester. Running every Wednesday during the spring and summer school terms, Tony and other adults cycle with up to

20 young people from Colden Common and Twyford - more info here plus a great video of another group doing the same (but bigger!) in Portland, Oregon. Could you start a similar initiative in your area?

HCC's Waste Prevention Community Grant Fund has reopened

Hampshire County Council has funding of up to £5,000 for projects which help to reduce household waste, such as:

- Community Fridges and Freezers or food sharing schemes mainly using food from households
- Community Composting schemes
- Community engagement activities to increase awareness, knowledge and understanding of preventing waste, for example events, books or workshops
- Rental and sharing schemes, for example 'Libraries of Things'
- Swapping events

• The 2022 United Nations Climate Change Conference will take place from November 6 to 18 in Sharm El-Sheikh, Egypt. This infographic from ECIU is an excellent visual explainer of what it's all about. The recently published 2022 United Nations Emissions Gap Report shows that urgent action is needed - existing national pledges on the climate crisis point to a 2.5°C temperature rise by the end of the century.

News and Views

This <u>small Scottish community</u> recently set up their own 'loch to kettle' hydroelectric community energy scheme, producing 280kW of energy.

It's often said that heat pumps won't work in traditional buildings - the National Trust are replacing oil boilers with heat pumps in many of their properties, including Kingston Lacey, a large 17th century Grade I listed country house in Dorset. Plus lots of case studies here.

Boundary Changes The parliamentary boundaries are changing, and this is the last chance to have your say on the proposals. The new map proposed by the Commission will make sure each constituency MP has between 69,724 and 77,062 electors. Unlike proposals outlined in the 2018 review the 2023 Winchester constituency will include the parishes of Compton, Shawford, Hursley, Otterbourne, Twyford and Colden Common as well as the addition of Bishops Waltham, Upper and Central Meon Valley. The final public consultation is open now until 5 **December** and is the last chance to provide your views on new constituency boundaries. The new revised proposals are now available to view via interactive an map https://www.bcereviews.org.uk/

Families from Ukraine Hampshire County Council pays an extra £200 per month to Hampshire residents hosting Ukrainian guests as part of the Government's Homes for Ukraine Scheme. Hampshire has welcomed more than 1,100 families. The new

payments will start in October and will be funded by a grant paid to support implementation of the Homes for Ukraine scheme locally.

Getting ready for winter Don't be surprised to see Hampshire County Council gritters out and about over the next few weeks. Gritting vehicles will be out on a trial run on priority one salt routes to ensure we are ready for the start of the winter season.
